And catching traces of that Coronavirus, which was death to him.


Good Friday happened in a thousand places. Where Jesus held the helpless and died with them.



EASTER GREETINGS

A favourite piece of music that I play every Easter is called 'Song of the Resurrection' by an Irish group called Fuaimlaoi. It tells the Gospel story of the Resurrection but not in an upbeat triumphant way. It sounds more solemn than joyful, but for me it captures perfectly the mood of the first Easter Sunday when the women went to the tomb in the early morning. They were grieving. They had seen for themselves the horror of the crucifixion a couple of days earlier. And even though they found an empty tomb and heard an astonishing message that 'he is not here; he is risen', there was still a sense of loss. Joy would come — but not immediately. They had to come to terms with the fact that everything had changed; life would never be the same again. Joy replaces mourning — but joy might be slow in coming.

For all of us who have lost someone we love, we may recognise that feeling. No matter how strong our faith that our loved ones are safe in the arms of God, we still have to face the reality of life without them. We learn to live with that loss. Hopefully we learn to feel joy again and faith helps us to move forward with hope. But there is still an empty place at the table and a pang of loss when we remember how life used to be.

The Easter story we celebrate this week promises hope and new life. The resurrection is not about going back to the way life was before: it invites us to look forward to a new and fuller life – which is beyond our sight for now. So like the Gospel women, we have a song of hope to sing but we still carry the scars and trauma of loss. The risen Jesus still bore the wounds of his suffering, the wounds that Thomas touched to prove they were real. Easter is a realistic celebration: it promises hope and joy but recognises that there is a journey to be made first.

As we journey together through these difficult times I offer, on behalf of all who are part of the parish, heartfelt thanks to all who have helped in any way when the days were difficult and the going was tough. For all the kind words, acts of generosity and selfless acts of service; for all the prayers offered and candles lit; for keeping hope alive in this our 'family of faith' – thank you. And a happy Easter to all.



Men's Rites of Passage, Kiltegan 18th - 22nd August 2021

Nowadays, the guestion of what it means to be a man can be perplexing, and to be a man of faith in Ireland today can be very difficult. Most men have a longing for the support and guidance of other men in their journey towards masculinity, maturity, and a

experience with the divine. Living a shallow unexamined life is an empty experience.
