

Jesus was very aware of the power of evil that can be around us. Jesus named the spirit whatever that meant. This gave him power over the spirit. He knew evil when he met it and he


overcame it, with love, power and with kindness for this man. In Jesus the good and the evil of the world met.

UPCOMING FEASTDAYS

1st Feb: St Brigid

Renowned for her hospitality, almsgiving and care of the sick. She received the veil and spiritual formation probably from St Mel and stayed for a period under his direction in Ardagh. Others followed her example which led her to found a double monastery in Kildare. The St Brigid's Cross, in legend used by Brigid to explain the Christian faith, remains a popular sign of God's protection.

2nd Feb: The Presentation of the Lord -Candlemas Day

This feast is a remembrance of the Lord and Mary, his mother. With candles in their hands, the people go out to meet the Lord and to acclaim him like Simeon, who recognised Christ as 'a light to reveal God to the nations'.

3rd Feb: St Blaise

The blessing of St Blaise is a sign of our faith in God's protection and love for us and for the sick. The Blessing is done using two crossed and unlighted candles, which are blessed on the memorial of St Blaise or on the feast of the Presentation on the Lord.
